

Alan Sommerville (GBR) 1947-2024

Alan Sommerville passes away

Former British Gymnastics President, Mr. Alan Sommerville, passed away in September 2024. A towering figure in the history of British gymnastics, Sommerville joined British Gymnastics in 1997 and served as Chairman and later as President from 2008 to 2016. His dedication to the sport, dating back to the 1960s, earned him the Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 2008.

Alan's journey in gymnastics began in the late 1960s, when he met nine-time British Champion and Olympian Nik Stuart, MBE. Together, they introduced gymnastics to communities across the UK through displays, coaching courses, and advocacy. Alan also demonstrated his vision at the grassroots level by founding Derbyshire's first gymnastics club, now known as Amber Valley Gymnastics Club.

Over the years, Sommerville's role in British Gymnastics expanded as he accompanied gymnasts globally, led national teams, and modernized gymnastics in the UK. His legacy as CEO, Chairman, and President is marked by a steadfast commitment to expanding the sport's reach and nurturing new talent.

Eric Poujade passes away

Born in 1972, Eric Poujade (FRA) passed away in July. He was an emblematic figure of men's artistic gymnastics.

His exceptional career has made his mark with his impressive results, particularly in pommel horse, where he was the undisputed specialist, obtaining throughout his career no less than four European medals including two gold (one per team), three World medals including one in World Cup, and an Olympic silver medal.

Carmen Algora de Sanjuan, the first woman to ever act as President of the Spanish Gymnastics Federation, passed away in August 2024.

Algora de Sanjuan played an important part in the development of gymnastics. Thanks to her efforts, Spain won its first ever Olympic medal in Rhythmic Gymnastics, at the Barcelona 1992 Olympic Games.

Executive Committee

Official News from the Executive Committee held in Paris (FRA) on 30 July-1 August 2024

The FIG Executive Committee (EC) met in Paris (FRA) on 30 July - 1 August. Here is a summary of the main decisions.

42nd FIG RHYTHMIC GYMNASTICS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The EC has accepted the proposal of the German Gymnastics Federation to allocate the 42nd FIG Rhythmic Gymnastics World Championships in 2026 to the city of Frankfurt instead of Berlin. This change will be submitted to the FIG Council for ratification.

ALLOCATION OF UPCOMING WORLD CUP AND WORLD CHALLENGE CUP EVENTS

The EC approved the schedule for the upcoming World Cup and World Challenge Cup events. The World Cups and World Challenge Cups in Artistic Gymnastics and Rhythmic Gymnastics were approved for the entire cycle (2025-2028), while the events in Acrobatic, Aerobic and Trampoline Gymnastics and Parkour were approved for 2025.

They will be published in the Calendar in due course.

TECHNICAL COMMITTEE PROPOSALS

The EC approved the following proposals and requests:

Rhythmic Gymnastics Technical Committee: based on the request of several National Federations, to implement a Rhythmic Gymnastics Symposium to present the new chang in the code of points and to engage coaches in discussing potential improvements and new ideas, with an aim of enhancing clarity and overall content quality.

Trampoline Gymnastics Technical Committee: to continue the research of the FIG testing institute in view of the development of a testing procedure to certify an inflatable tumbling track.

PROPOSALS FROM COMMISSIONS / WORKING GROUPS

The EC approved the proposals from the following commissions / working groups:

Marketing, Branding and TV Rights Commission: the EC agreed on the next steps of the rebranding project

Paralympics & Special Olympics Working Group: the EC agreed to submit the following projects to the Congress:

Implementing Para-gymnastics in Artistic Gymnastics



Adding Para-gymnastics to the Statutes

PROPOSED CHANGES TO RULES

The EC approved the proposed changes to the following rules and regulations:

- Appendix to the Codes of Points
- RG specific judges' rules

The approved changes will be published on the FIG website in due course.

Official News from the Executive Committee held in Doha (QAT) on 22-23 October 2024

PROPOSALS FROM COMMISSIONS / WORKING GROUPS

The EC approved the proposals from the following commissions / working groups:

- Competition Innovation Commission: To establish guidelines for the evaluation of the World Cup and Challenge Cup events during the cycle 2025-2028.
- To work on the establishment of a World Ranking list that includes all FIG Official competitions (World Championships, World Cups and Challenge Cups)

PROPOSED CHANGES TO RULES

The EC approved changes to the rules for the Medical Organisation of FIG Competitions and Events. The revised rules will be published on the FIG website in due course.

85TH FIG CONGRESS

The EC approved the running of the Congress meeting (24-26 October). The draw for the order of the presentations of candidates for the position of FIG President (election on 25 October) also took place. Farid Gayibov (AZE) will present first, and Morinari Watanabe (JPN) will present second.



Congress

Official News from the 85th congress held in Doha (QAT), 24-26 October 2024

The 85th FIG Congress concluded in Doha (QAT) today with 157 out of the organisation's 159 affiliated federations attending the event in the Qatari capital and five new affiliated national federations joining the gymnastics family.

During the official opening ceremony, Sara Al Mesnad, Head of the International Cooperation Section at Qatar Olympic Committee, welcomed the delegates on behalf of the Qatar Olympic Committee.

"Here in Doha, our commitment to gymnastics runs deep. Over the years, Qatar has built a reputation as a global sporting hub – not just because of the events we host, but because of the people who make it all happen. People like Mr. Ali Al-Hitmi. As one of the founding members and the current President of the Qatar Gymnastics Federation, Ali has dedicated his career to growing the sport - here in Qatar, in the region, and beyond. His leadership has helped put athletes first, creating the right environment for them to thrive."

The opening day was devoted to a review of activities from the past two years presented in the form of reports by the FIG President, the Presidents of all Technical Committees, the Gymnastics for All Committee and the Parkour Commission as well as the Presidents of each Continental Union.

Micheline Calmy-Rey, President of the Gymnastics Ethics Foundation, presented the foundation's activities over the past four years. <u>See here for more information</u>.

FIG Foundation for Solidarity member Albertine Gonçalves presented the activities of the foundation covering the past four years and reminded the assembly that the resources of the foundation are available to those national federations in need of assistance. See here for more information.

ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT AND FIG GOVERNING BODIES

The second day of the Congress was devoted to elections to appoint all FIG governing bodies. FIG President Morinari Watanabe (JPN) was re-elected for a third term. The full results of the election can be found here.

Following his re-election, FIG President Morinari Watanabe said, "Now is the time for gymnastics to take a big step forward. We are one gymnastics family. We respect each other. Let's work together to create a bright future."

FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Congress approved the 2022 and 2023 accounts and financial reports as well as the report from the elected auditors and the external auditor.



The financial plan for the 2025-2028 quadrennial was also presented and approved by the Congress. Mr Vincent Bernasconi was appointed external auditor.

NEW MEMBER FEDERATIONS

Delegates approved the membership of five new affiliated national gymnastics federations, bringing the total number of affiliated federations to 164. While the gymnastics federation of Antigua and Barbuda (ANT), which counts a population of less than 100,000, has been granted full affiliation after being an associate member, the remaining four new members all come from Africa and represent a total population of over 100 million with a huge potential for developing gymnastics in the region. They are Cote d'Ivoire (CIV), Guinea (GUI), Kenya (KEN) and Zambia (ZAM).

STATUTES

The Congress approved modifications to the FIG Statutes, the most notable of which was the inclusion of Para Gymnastics as a new discipline, initially for artistic gymnastics, with the following definition:

"Competitive Gymnastics performed on different pieces of apparatus for those gymnasts with approved Para classification."

Furthermore, the objective "to promote and develop the sport of gymnastics at all levels worldwide, considering evolving community needs, fostering inclusion and innovation to enhance the sport and stimulate wider participation" was also added, along with several provisions that will allow the FIG to implement its rebranding project.

It is also important to note that the removal of the GEF [Gymnastics Ethics Foundation] Appeal Tribunal has been approved. Disciplinary proceedings within the GEF will now consist of a single level, handled by the Disciplinary Commission, with its decisions directly appealable to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS). Both the FIG and the GEF welcome this decision, as it will save time and money by eliminating an unnecessary judicial layer.



1. Opening of the Council

President Watanabe is pleased to welcome the participants to the beautiful city of Shanghai. He thanks his excellency Mr Zhou Jinqiang, as well as the Chinese Gymnastics Association, its President Mr Miao Zhongyi and its 2 Vice-Presidents for inviting the FIG Family. Sports has the power to change the society and to develop true friendships. He declares the 24th FIG Council meeting officially open.

His Excellency, Mr Zhou Jinqiang, Vice-Minister of Sport of China and Vice-President of the Chinese Olympic Committee, greets the audience. He is delighted that this important meeting takes place in Shanghai (CHN). Many important sport events have been hosted by China. He wishes everyone an



enjoyable stay and fruitful meetings. Shanghai is one of the cities where Gymnastics first started in China.

In turn the Secretary General greets the participants. He provides logistical information pertaining to the two coming days. Everything that will be said during the meeting will be recorded (floor and English translation). The company Lumi is in charge of the voting system that will be in use.

2. Introduction of the Members

The Secretary General recalls that the duties and responsibilities of the 45 Council members are listed under Article 12.2 of the Statutes. He proceeds with the roll call, and excuses Li Li Leung (USA); Jani Tanskanen (FIN); Daniela Delle Chiaie (ITA); Saqer Almulla (KUW); Ruslan Mustaev (UZB); Abdessadeq Bitari (MAR); Hala Salama Youssef Hamoud (EGY); Maria Luciene Cacho Resende (BRA) and Alice Stooke (AUS) who could not be present.

President Watanabe asks the assembly to observe a minute of silence in memory of those who have passed away since the last Council meeting.

3. Control of the voting rights, quorum (50%)

Members with voting rights present: 36 Simple majority: 19 Two-third majority: 24 The quorum is reached.

4. Composition of the Voting Office

The Secretary General informs the Council that the Executive Committee (EC) proposes the following persons for the voting office: Naomi Valenzo as President, as well as Ita Yuliati and Hanspeter Tschopp as Members.

▶ Decision: the proposal is approved with 33 yes, 0 no and 1 abstention.

5. Approval of the Agenda

The Secretary General asks if anyone wishes to amend the proposed agenda. In agreement with those present, item No. 15.6 of the agenda: "Presentation by the LOC of the 2027 ART WCH in Chengdu (CHN)" will be dealt with on the 1st day of meeting at 15:00.

▶ Decision: the proposed agenda is approved with 34 yes, 1 no and 1 abstention.

6. Approval of the Minutes of the 2023 Council Meeting in Antalya (TUR)

The Secretary General recalls that those minutes were posted on the FIG Intranet and published in the FIG Bulletin No. 261. Any remarks had to be received by 30 September 2023 at the very latest. None was received.

▶ Decision: the minutes are approved with 34 yes, 0 no and 1 abstention.



7. President's report

The report of President Watanabe begins with the upcoming 2024 Paris Olympic Games. Obviously, transportation and security will be the major issues. The conditions proposed for our sports were not always ideal, but thanks to the Secretary General and to the TC Presidents, everything will be fine. He visited UKR and was sorry about the current situation in the country. We have to protect our gymnasts.

Except for TRA, RUS gymnasts were not able or were not willing to participate in the Olympic qualifying events. On the other hand, several BLR athletes were in a position to prove their neutral status. All those gymnasts have been practicing Gymnastics almost for their entire life, and the Olympic Games are their ultimate goal. If this kind of situation would happen again in the future, the FIG commits to never act under political pressure. Until now, gymnasts have always come first, and it will always be the case. A working group was created in this respect called "Gymnastics & Peace", and its members are himself, Ali Al-Hitmi, Suat Celen, Donatella Sacchi and Nicolas Buompane. The goal is to become a role model in this field.

The President quotes the various commissions and working groups that have been created since the beginning of the current cycle as well as their respective purposes: revision of our Statutes, wellbeing of the aging society through Gymnastics, inclusion of Paralympics in our programme, transgender and health issues, education and knowledge transmission worldwide, addition of new member federations and how to keep them within the Gymnastics family, point ranking list for the World Cup and World Challenge Cup events, Olympic qualifications for the next cycle, rebranding of the FIG, marketing revenues, etc.

President Watanabe refers to the various cases of sexual harassment that occurred in the past, and more specifically to what happened in the USA. The concerned federation had to pay huge amounts of money to the victims and lost many important sponsors. This is one of the reasons why the FIG decided to have its own Safeguarding working group. Its members successfully developed the 10 Golden Rules.

To be successful the collaboration and the understanding of all stakeholders is needed. The President thanks the Council for its attention.

8. Ratification of decisions made by the Executive Committee

Nicolas Buompane has nothing to report under this agenda item.

9. Technical Regulations - Proposals from the National Federations and from the FIG

The Secretary General goes through the proposed amendments and comments on what requires further specification when needed. A global vote will be requested at the end of the presentation in order to approve all proposals at once. All of them were previously discussed with the TC Presidents and with the EC members. Only two member Federations submitted some proposals.

Art. 7.3: the proposal is to publish all codes of points in English only. Until now, those documents were provided in few other languages only, which was not fair. Besides, translating rules always has a great chance of error. Translations remain possible, but from now on the English version will prevail.



Naomi Valenzo: is not against the proposal, but is it possible to vote on this item separately?

Patricia Dieguez Pilona: is it possible to use translations during the judges' courses? There is a lack of judges in PAGU. Many people do not speak English fluently. What if there is a majority of Spanish speaking participants? And who will pay for the translations if need be?

Nicolas Buompane fully understands the situation. If need be, educational material will be made available in other languages than English by the concerned Federations or Continental Unions. It will still be possible to have translations. Nevertheless, with regard to the development, the FIG already spends CHF 300'000.—per Continental Union (CHF 200'000.—for the OGU) on a yearly basis. He undertakes to provide assistance and to show flexibility. He opens the vote.

▶ Decision: Art. 7.3: the proposal is approved with 30 yes, 6 no and 0 abstention (36 received votes).

At the end of the presentation, the Secretary General asks for a global vote to approve all proposals.

▶ Decision: All proposed changes in the 7 sections of the Technical Regulations are approved with 34 yes, 0 no and 0 abstention.

10. Financial Matters

Presentation of the 2023 Accounts

The Secretary General informs the members that a loss of 1,7 million was foreseen in the first place, but we finally ended up with a loss of CHF 900'000.--.

Nicolas Buompane highlights the various topics that explain the difference, such as the additional costs for the gala of the 2023 World Gymnaestrada in Amsterdam (NED), the higher television income of the ART WCH, the scoring system for the Junior ART WCH, the costs of the Word Cups, etc. We may wonder how we can lose money with the apparatus testing certification. We could try to at least break even by increasing the relevant fees. About the licenses for our gymnasts, at the time former FIG President Bruno Grandi wanted to link those licenses with an insurance. The covid period helped us saving a lot of money due to the fact that all meetings were held remotely. Nowadays, the travel costs are very expensive. This will be taken into consideration in the future. Moreover, we used to have a contract with VTB, and the USD 1 million we received on a yearly basis was spent on the development through the continental unions. Now that this sponsorship no longer exists, the FIG has to cover the total amount of CHF 300'000.—per continental union and per year, except for the OGU which receives an amount of CHF 200'000.—per year.

Nicolas strongly advises the members to look at the new platform for E-learning. He thanks Olivia and Anis for their great job. About communication, an additional amount of money was needed for the "Road to Paris" presentation. It is currently difficult to find skilled staff. The financial results depend on the financial market. He concludes the presentation by mentioning the additional funding that was requested by the GEF in order not to go bankrupt.

• Report from the elected Auditors and the Professional Auditor

On behalf of Hanspeter Tschopp, of the Professional Auditor and of himself, Ron Froehlich delivers his report. The presentation made by the Secretary General is comprehensive. We have to realize that the costs are increasing. We have to find new sponsors to help us improving our incomes. Some



meetings with the banks are held each time an audit is conducted in Lausanne, with the attendance of the Secretary General and the Financial Director. A new bank will be contacted in order to spread the risks within 3 different establishments. We need more revenues. No discrepancies in the accounts were found at the time of the audit which took place in February 2024. We still have our provisions for the currency and stock-market differences. The financial market was good until recently, but it is now going down. Everything was made in accordance with the Swiss law. He therefore recommends the Council to approve the 2023 accounts.

Cynthia Carrion Norton: is it possible to get sponsorships from specific countries only or from any countries? Ron Froehlich and Nicolas Buompane answer that any countries would be welcome.

Approval of the 2023 Accounts

The Secretary General thanks the auditors for their precious cooperation. He asks the Council to approve those accounts.

▶ Decision: The Council approves the 2023 accounts as well as the Auditors' report with 33 yes, 1 no and 1 abstention.

President Watanabe is of the opinion that we need to improve our strategy. We have to evolve in order to attract sponsors. Currently, there is no advertising space on our events. We have to amend our structure, and some new commissions and working groups are already working on that.

Vassily Titov: recalls that VTB was a sponsor during 8 consecutive years.

Athanasia S. Lampropoulou: our disciplines are beautiful and clean. We have to be more attractive and modern to attract more audience. Efficient marketing and social media companies should be appointed to help us. Morinari Watanabe answers that the Japanese company Dentsu is an expert in this field.

Eizabeth Smith: if we continue to do things the same way, there will be no change. We have to improve and to analyze our problems. We need to take note of how much the world and the life have changed in the past 3 years. Nowadays, people are looking for entertainment. Everything is link to the budget in the end. President Watanabe agrees. How is it possible to watch competitions during 3 hours or more? We are too conservative. Some IFs are no longer interested in public audience but in online audience only. We have to change our mentality. Not only opinions of the Gymnastics community, but also opinions from outside should be heard. He asks for the support of the Council.

Presentation of the 2024 revised Budget

Nicolas Buompane recalls that during the cycle there are always new projects that need to be approved, and obviously this has an impact on the budget. This is a normal procedure. The initial plan was to have a loss of CHF 5,7 million at the end of 2024. He recalls that we do not have WCH for our Olympic disciplines during the Olympic years. At this moment in time, a loss of CHF 6,7 million is expected. The main reasons for this increase are the new working groups that were created, representation expenses, Congress and Council meetings that are more expensive than foreseen, new staff member in charge of governing and institutional governance, additional funding for the GEF, etc. All those items were new but crucial.

• Report from the Auditors

On behalf of Ron Froehlich and himself, Hanspeter Tschopp reports that the elected auditors have to give an independent and unpolitical opinion on the budget. The Council has to approve a budget



of which half of the total amount has already been spent. Maybe the FIG should think about that and try to have an approval at an earlier stage. The budget is a living document. We currently have to accept an additional loss of CHF 1 million. Because of the removal of the VTB sponsorship, we might even have a bigger loss. In 2024 it will not be possible to draw on reserve funds as we did in 2023. As auditors, they recommend to approve the 2024 revised budget.

Approval of the 2024 revised Budget

The Secretary General asks the Council to approve the 2024 revised budget.

▶ Decision: The Council approves the 2024 revised budget as well as the Auditors' report with 32 yes, 1 no and 1 abstention.

Information on the 2021-2024 Quadrennial Plan

The Secretary General specifies that this item does not require any approval. The situation is the following: the Congress approved a loss of CHF 5,3 million in 2021. The covid changed many things, and we had to face many changes with regard to the finances. The current expectation is to be break even or to have a much smaller loss due to the fact that the development funds will have to be fully covered by the FIG.

Nicolas shows what the improvement potential is at this stage: new marketing strategy, sponsorship and television incomes, increase in the operational effectiveness, etc.

• Taxes of competitions (competition fees)

On behalf of the EC, Nicolas Buompane recommends not to amend the taxes of competitions.

▶ Decision: The Council tacitly agrees not to amend the taxes of competitions.

11. Membership: (provisional) admission, resignation, suspension, expulsion

Admission (provisional)

Nicolas Buompane is pleased to report that 3 finalized applications were received within deadline. The new applicants are GAM (The Gambia), GUI (Guinea) and ZAM (Zambia).

▶ Decision: The Council agrees to grant provisional affiliation to GAM (The Gambia), GUI (Guinea) and ZAM (Zambia) with 32 yes, 0 no and 0 abstention, 32 yes, 2 no and 1 abstention, and 30 yes, 2 no and 2 abstentions respectively. Those affiliations will have to be ratified by the 2024 Congress in Doha (QAT).

12. Allocation of FIG Events

• 2028 ACRO, AER, PK WCH and 2029 World Gym for Life Challenge

Regretfully, no finalized bids were received within deadline with regard to the 2028 WCH and the 2029 World Gym for Life Challenge. The Secretary General asks the Council to give the EC the authority to allocate those events as soon as finalized bid contracts will be received by the office.

▶ Decision: The Council agrees to allow the EC to allocate all concerned events in due course.

Nicolas Buompane shows the list of all events as yet unassigned. He asks for the Council's assistance to find suitable LOCs.

13. Potential proposals to be submitted to the Congress

The Secretary General reports that no proposals have to be submitted to the Congress.

14. 2025 Council Meeting

According to the continental rotation in effect, the 2025 Council should have been hosted by an OGU Federation. Since no applications were received, a new deadline was set and all member federations had the opportunity to submit a bid. Nicolas Buompane informs the Council that only one finalized bid contract was received. It comes from MLT (Qawra) and fulfils all our requirements.

The MLT representatives are not present, but they sent a short video. The proposed dates for the Council meeting are 9 and 10 May 2025.

▶ Decision: The Council decides to allocate the 2025 Council to MLT (Qawra) with 34 yes, 0 no and 0 abstention.

Morinari Watanabe refers to the 2025 ART WCH which have been allocated to INA (Jakarta) a few weeks ago. The world and the society are changing, and it is good to see that young member federations are now able to host important events. On the same topic, RWA only joined the FIG two years ago and already hosted the 2024 RG African Championships, which was a qualifying event for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. Like some of our member federations, sometimes the FIG tends to be conservative, but we have to be ready to face new challenges.

Ita Yuliati: thanks President Watanabe, Mr Alshathri and Nicolas Buompane for their support and for their trust. INA is pleased to have the opportunity to host the 2025 ART WCH. With the support of her government, she is looking forward to welcoming everyone to Jakarta.

2nd Meeting Day

President Watanabe opens the meeting. Nicolas Buompane makes the roll call. At the beginning of the second meeting day, the numbers are the following:

Simple majority: 18 Two-third majority: 23



The quorum is reached.

15. Miscellaneous

15.1 2024 Olympic Games in Paris (FRA)

The Secretary General provides a few numbers regarding this event: in total there will be 318 quota places available for Gymnastics, and 50 countries will be represented. The FIG is successful as all our events are already sold out. It is obvious that the Paris LOC is trying to save as much money as possible. Transportation will be a big challenge, especially for the RG competitions that do not take place at the Bercy Arena, but at the Porte de la Chapelle Arena, and some strikes might possibly occur during the Olympic Games. Moreover, the level of security will have to be very high given that the risk of terrorist attack remains high. He shows a promotional video provided by the 2024 Paris LOC. The TC Presidents and the FIG staff are working as a team and are ready for the event. We already know that the total amount that will be shared within the IFs is USD 540 million. We are lucky that President Watanabe is an IOC Member since almost 50% of our incomes come from the IOC.

15.2 2024 FIG Congress in Doha (QAT)

Ali Al-Hitmi warmly greets the audience in Arabic. He comments on the preparation of the 2024 Congress which will be held in Doha (QAT) in October 2024. A site visit took place at the end of April 2024. Everything went well and the QAT LOC is ready to welcome everyone to Doha. The stay will be unforgettable. He shows a video of the city. There will be 2 official hotels in Doha: Sheraton Grand Hotel and Meridien Hotel, and a medical clinic will be available in both hotels.

Serge Van Poelvoorde provides information on the visa application procedure. If need be, the application will be covered and managed by the QAT LOC. The same goes for the health certification.

Ali concludes the presentation by showing the new and official email address that was created for the event: figcongress@qatargymn.com. He is looking forward to welcoming the Gymnastics family to Doha.

15.3 Possible addition of Paralympic discipline (ART only)

As the President of the working group in charge of this new project, Nellie Kim, explains that there is an increasing interest to add Para-Gymnastics to the FIG calendar. She introduces the names of the members of the working group which was created upon the President's request. The International Paralympic Committee is the body in charge of all Paralympic sports. She presents a video of existing events. The goal is to have Gymnastics included in the programme of the 2032 Brisbane (US) Paralympic Games with ART only as a first step. A roadmap has been developed in order to achieve this ambitious goal. A dedicated email address is already available: paragymnastics@figgymnastics.org

Noha Abou Shabana: thanks President Watanabe and Nellie Kim for giving hope to the disabled gymnasts.

Ita Yuliati: is it possible to share the video? Nellie Kim says yes. The parents of the disabled little girl already confirmed their approval. Nicolas Buompane will share the video with all Council members.



Ehab Esawy: the working group had to start from zero. This is a difficult but very emotional task. He thanks Nellie Kim for managing this project in a very fast and professional way. All members are committed to make it successful.

Kenia Herrera: her federation is currently helping a child who lost her leg because of bone cancer. This young girl will be thrilled to know that she will still be part of the Gymnastics family thanks to this new project.

Nicolas Buompane agrees that those people have to be included in the Gymnastics family. There are two main groups: para which means with a physical handicap, and special with mental handicap. The first step will be to have para and ART. This project will require a lot of work and involvement, and a full-time Sports Manager will have to be hired. In October 2024, the Congress will be requested to accept the inclusion of this new discipline in our Statutes.

President Watanabe thanks Nellie for her presentation. When he was in UKR he could see many children with amputated limbs because of the conflict. We also have to think about the PLE children. He is ready to do everything possible to help all children. The presentation will be shared with everyone.

15.4 Re-branding of the FIG

Nicolas Buompane informs the members on the current situation of the new rebranding project that has been endorsed by the President and by the EC. We have to be ready for the future and to improve our image. Several surveys were conducted with all stakeholders. It was found that GfA tends to be forgotten. We have to make sure that this important community is considered as a real part of the FIG. A new name and a new logo will have to be approved by the Congress. The current official name "FIG" will remain in our Statutes as the legal name of the organization, but in terms of marketing, the intention is to use the name "World Gymnastics" inspiring movement. Respect, friendship and excellence will be the new motto. If the new name is accepted by the Congress, a new logo will have to be approved too. Furthermore, the commission members recommend to amend the names of our disciplines. Except for GfA, "Gymnastics" should no longer be added after the names of each discipline. The use of "Aerobic" will be double-checked, and we might have "Acro" instead of "Acrobatic" as requested by Rosy Taeymans. The presentation will be shared with all Council members.

15.5 National Federation Survey (questionnaire – Insights)

The Secretary General introduces the new NF Insights project which is a global snapshot of the Gymnastics family. The purpose is to have a better understanding of the conditions of all our member federations. We were happy to notice that the response rate is very high, although we cannot expect all our members to participate. In due course, the outcome will be shared with all the Gymnastics community. This is an ambitious project which will be a very helpful tool.

15.6 2027 ART WCH in Chengdu (CHN) - Presentation by the LOC

The representatives of the LOC start the presentation by showing a video of the city and of the venues. The city already hosted several major sport events and will be the host city of the 2025 World Games. A task force has been appointed to insure a professional organization of this important event. There is no doubt that the 2027 ART WCH in Chengdu (CHN) will be a very successful event.



End of the session

The President officialy thanks the representatives the CHN LOC and present them with recognition medals and with the FIG pennant.

The Secretary General thanks the members for their precious collaboration and for their trust. He thanks Lumi, the interpretors and all the FIG staff on site.

Before closing the meeting at 11:45, Morinari Watanabe thanks all participants for the smooth meeting. As we are at the end of a cycle, this Council meeting will be the last one for several members. He warmly thanks Lise Lorentzen Mandal, Stoian Dimitrov, Rosy Taeymans, Alejandro Peniche, Miao Zhonghyi and Hanspeter Tschopp for their dedication. He congratulates the Secretary General on the good work.









Comparison of average final score in Qualifications




Comparison of average D score in Qualifications & Apparatus medalists'






Comparison of average E score in Qualifications & Apparatus medalists'



Top 8 gymnasts' average N of apparatuses performed during Qualifications.




Analyzing average number of apparatuses performed by top 8 gymnasts helps us clarify the "indicator of specialty" of a given apparatus, the level of its "remoteness" from All-Around gymnastics. As we can see, Rings has the lowest number of performed apparatuses by top 8 gymnasts with an average 2.125 and no-one among all finalists performed 6 apparatuses during the Qualifications.



The second most specialised apparatus is the Pommel Horse with an average of 2.250 performed apparatuses. Pommel Horse had only 1 All-Arounder among its finalists. The other apparatuses are to be considered with moderate to low indicator of specialty having an average in the range of 3-5 apparatuses. Floor has the highest number of performed apparatuses with an average of 5.125, the majority of finalists (6) performed all six apparatuses in the Qualifications.

Compared to the last year's world championships in Antwerp, gymnasts on average performed less apparatuses, with a possible reason of not having to compete All-Around to qualify for the future competitions.

Difference between medalists & Qualifications average scores



In given statistics High Bar column can be partially overlooked because of an extraordinary and unique Apparatus Final, which saw 6 gymnasts (out of 8) to fall, including 2 Olympic bronze medalists!

Putting High Bar aside, floor is the apparatus with lowest difference in all three scores between medalists and an average gymnast. That puts floor to be the piece of apparatus that gymnasts on average perform well, thus ensuring denser contest for the Final and higher diversity of athletes showing good results and winning medals. An average gymnast should increase E score for just 0.396 and D score for 0,795 in order to be in the medals.

Pommel horse column is noticeably taller compared to others. Pommel horse is the apparatuses with most severe separation between medalists and an average gymnast, those have much narrower group of gymnasts contesting for the medals. All three Olympic pommel horse medalists are specialists on this apparatus and performed only one apparatus during the whole competitions.



Pommel horse has the highest final score detachment, both D and E scores need to be way higher (average of 1 full mark) than that of an average gymnast in order to get a medal. Especially E score's detachment is remarkably high, the largest E score detachment among all apparatuses of 1.041. All in all, the final score should be improved by more than 2.0 marks!

Rings and Parallel Bars share a similar story, though in a more moderate scale, the final score should be improved by 1.6, primarily due to the difference in D score, thus meaning that an average gymnast performs these apparatuses relatively clean, though in order to be in the medals D score should be improved way higher.

Statistics clearly shows that there is no apparatus where only one of the scores should be improved in order to content for the medals. Both E and D scores differ considerably from an average performance on <u>all</u> apparatuses. The detachment of 0.051 of E score on High Bar, as mentioned above, is an extraordinary exception, but still holds the truth. For reference, on all examined apparatuses the difference of D score is higher than of E score, with the exception of Pommel horse, where medalists have remarkably greater E score, which highlights their technical proficiency above an average gymnast.

The level of performance and average scores on all apparatuses are in general higher compared to the last year's world championships in Antwerp, which emphasizes the highest importance and mastery level at the Olympics.





Judges briefing

All relevant information was received from Members of the MTC. The judge's instructions for the D-Juries and E-Juries were conducted separately. For the first time during Olympic Games MTC had used interactive quiz for testing exercises evaluation during judges' instructions. Every judge was able to test themselves using their smartphone and straight after receive feedback and personal results (by points) for the testing. Results of the tests gave the MTC necessary information about the method to test exercise evaluations.

Podium training

Podium Training for the competition was conducted in accordance with the Qualifications schedule. All D judges stayed for all subdivisions in the venue during podium training. The D-Juries evaluated all the routines that were shown by the gymnasts during the podium training. All controversial elements were immediately discussed with the coaches.

Competition

Generally, competition was well organized and managed by POGOC. Schedule of subdivisions was conducted in order with timetable. In the warming up area all apparatus were placed on the podium, which is perfectly convenient for gymnasts. There were some Apparatus finalists using Warming up hall for their training during the All-Around warming up session, I strongly recommend regulating this condition more carefully for the future events.

The D-Juries were very consistent and used the same criteria to evaluate the performances of all gymnasts. 16 inquires submitted, 12 was rejected. SJ used JSS to solve all inquire cases.

E judges work was evaluated by JEP program in all phases of the competition. MTC had conducted PCVR. Longest phase - Qualifications was consistent in evaluation from first until the last subdivision.


Women's Artistic Gymnastics Technical Committee Report






Comparison of the highest/lowest Final Scores – all 4 apparatus in the Qualifications










Comparison of the average D-score/E-score/Final score on all 4 apparatus in the Qualifications:




Comparison of the highest/lowest Final Scores – all 4 apparatus in the Team Final:











Comparison of the highest/lowest Final Scores – all 4 apparatus in the All-Around Final:



Extreme D- and E- Scores in the All-Around Final:










Comparison of Vault groups






D-score 1st and 2nd Vault in detail

Judges' Review Session (Instruction)

D and E exercises were published in STS for judges to practice before their arrival to Paris.

D-judges sent to the TC an excel file with their detailed analysis of 6 routines on each apparatus (DV/CR/CV) and 12 vaults.

E-judges sent their deductions via google form. 6 routines on each apparatus (BB and FX artistry and execution evaluation) and 13 vaults (evaluation by phases).

The analysis of 3 selected routines on each apparatus / 6 vaults were shown in STS after receiving the judges' evaluations; the remaining routines were analysed by the ASs concerned during the judge's instructions on site.

The WTC prepared the PPTs for the meeting with the D-judges and E-judges' instructions with clarifications concerning important topics on each apparatus needed to be highlighted.



Judges' draw

Due to the limited number of judges for the Olympic Games, it was not possible to draw neutral E-judges for the Team Final.

· Assessment of the Judging

D- Panel

The standard of the D-panel judges was very high. The judges were consistent in their evaluation of elements and applied the FIG Code of Points accurately to every exercise. They should be congratulated for their preparation and professional integrity.

E- Panels

The WTC would like to congratulate the E-judges for the high level of assessment throughout all competitions. The judges were consistent in making deductions according to the COP; they must be commended for their objectivity and quality of work.

Judges' placement

The Judges' panels and Apparatus Supervisors sat in one line, outside the field of play and were separated by barriers. The assistants (line and time judges) were seated at the end of the judges' line.

Judges' evaluation (JEP)

All exercises from Team Final, All-Around Final and Apparatus Finals were evaluated by the WTC (PCVR). A very high percentage of E-judges received an "Excellent" overall evaluation. No "bias" evaluation highlighted by the JEP programme.





VENUE AND APPARATUS

Competition Format:

Team Qualifications: 4 gymnasts competed and the 3 highest scores counted.

Team Final: 3 gymnasts competed – 3 scores counted.

Touch Warm-up: each team did their touch warm-up separately one after the other. Competition: the gymnasts from the two teams competed alternately one after the other.

Apparatus Finals

9 gymnasts competed in the FX Final due to an unbreakable tie in the 8th place. 4 gymnasts warmed-up and competed in the first group and 5 gymnasts in the second group.

Dr Binder was always available and prepared to deal with any medical problem. His calm and pleasant manner gave the gymnasts and coaches great reassurance when dealing with any injury, regardless of its level.

9. CONCLUSION AND THANKS

After the "silent" Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games due to Covid 19, the audience crowding the Paris Bercy Arena was an injection of adrenaline for the gymnasts.

The stands were at full capacity every day of competition. About 15'000 spectators came to support the athletes from the respective countries and were very appreciative of all routines. The air was full of energy highlighting the exceptional performances of former champions and new rising stars. The look and feel of the venue, specifically the colour and the brightness enhanced the atmosphere for the gymnasts and the spectators.

As usual, the conclusion of the Games calls for reflection. It is a time to improve rules and procedures, and to deepen the understanding of how technological support can help in the future. More than ever, the WTC is committed to seizing this opportunity to study measures aimed at improving the overall organization and resolving the difficulties encountered.



ORGANIZATION

In November 2023, the FIG Executive Committee decided not to organize the 2024 World Acrobatic Gymnastics Championships and the World Age Group Competitions in Holon (ISR) due to the current situation.

Consequently, the bidding procedure for the 2024 event was reopened to all national federations.

After the Portuguese Gymnastics Federation submitted its bid, the FIG EC allocated the 2024 Acrobatic Gymnastics World Championships and World Age Group Competitions to Portugal (Guimarães) in September 2024.







JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

An "FIG Acrobatic Gymnastics Junior World Championships" (JWCH) was conducted as a trial event during these WAGC, as it was approved by the FIG EC in May 2023. Finalists were selected from the older WAGC age groups, 13 - 19. The top five All-Around competitors from each Acro's five categories — Men's Pair, Women's Pair, Mixed Pair, Women's Group, and Men's Group — earned their spot to participate in the Junior World finals. THE JWCH was a big success. The final of this event was very attractive and exciting, delivering a spectacular show for everyone in attendance. Participants from 28 countries from all five continental unions took part as follows:

SCORING SYSTEM and JUDGING

Thanks to Mr AL-TABBAA Mouhammed Youssef, EC member, for acting as Jury of appeal.

During the WAGC, the scoring system provider was "ACRO COMPANION." The judging was working with them in all aspects:

- 1. **Difficulty**: the Difficulty' judges used the electronic system during competitions, which prevents calculation errors and rule violations.
- 2. **E-judging** "Real-time E-judging" on the Tariff sheets on screen. The judges don't have to use shorthand notation on paper, which means they can look at the floor almost without interruption. They can't go back and adjust their score/deductions, and therefore the scores are so much more objective and correct. In addition and important for TV and live stream:
- ⇒ 1 second after the exercise is finished, the E-scores are in.
- 3. A-judging electronically.

In addition to all the advantages concerning the competitions' judging, scoring, and speed, it was also a very sustainable paper-free competition,

because of this electronic judging system: in addition of all schedules and results that were delivered by email and WhatsApp,

No tariff sheets and no judging papers were used.



MEASUREMENTS

The following number of height deductions were applied during the WAGC:

- 12 18: There were 10 size deductions
- 13 19: There were 7 size deductions

Measurements by schedules were completed following the rules.

INQUIRIES

There was only one inquiry during the whole event, which was rejected.


PARTICIPATION

For the judge's instruction, the Acro TC used well-prepared power points for E and A judging. These included short video clips of elements and deductions from the COP that were identified. The judges could also still use the STS material to practice and prepare themselves for the competition.

Judges' Draw

The judge's draw before the qualifications were conducted in the TC's room in the presence of Mr Suat SELEN – FIG Vice-President and Maria FUMEA -FIG EC Member, both served as a Jury of Appeal, and the two invited CJP's of the competition. They were conducted professionally and efficiently.

For the finals, we conducted the draw only from neutral judges. This draw took place immediately after the Qualifications. Following persons were invited to attend this draw: the Jury of Appeal, CJPs and ACRO Sports Manager - Rui Vinagre.

IRCOS VIDEO SYSTEMS / SWISS TIMING / ACRO COMPANION

At the WCH the official scoring system was Swiss Timing providing the results. They worked together with Acro Companion which provided Difficulty and Execution Real time judging. They worked together very well and smoothly.

The IRCOS system was in place and provided a user-friendly access to the video feeds for review and an excellent quality of the picture resolution. The investment to fund this system is well worth it.

For the first time there was a Worldwide streaming of the event by the FIG TV Channel. This will help the promotion of our discipline. On behalf of the Acro TC, I extend my sincere and deepest thanks to the IRCOS, Swiss Timing, and Acro Companion teams for their friendly and flexible attitude and professional collaboration.

As usual, it was a pleasure to work with them.

 Originally, the steps were planned to be Taishan but the ITA NF could not get them and as a last minute, managed to have the Venturelli certified and delivered.







Halls

General warm-up area

There was a big mat for the warmup area but the space was not big enough. Therefore, at the venue inspection, we have rearranged the training area to be used with the pathway where the gymnasts were able to do their warm-up and move on to the next training area.

Training hall

Training hall was in the same gymnasium with 2 aerobic floors and 2 marked floors. There was also the marked floor with music at a hall next to the competition area to allow music to be played.

Competition hall

Beautifully decorated competition venue with huge display as a back panel for the competition floor with gymnasts' video, results, ranking were shown.

Judge's meeting room

Judge's instruction and draw were made at the orientation meeting room, with good conditions. They provided with water, coffee/tea and snacks for the break. This room was also used for Medical Round Table and AER-TC Round Table.

TC meeting room

The room was equipped with necessary devices. Unfortunately, there was no air circulation in the meeting room but was provided with a fan. Outside of this room, there was a room where LOC have provided with some snacks and drinks.

Catering

On the upper floor, the catering place were made. With reservations made in advance, lunch was provided at this area. Variety of Italian food was provided and all tasted excellent.

For WAGC, LOC provided their scoring system by "GymResult". The system worked very well. Some troubles occurred but was solved immediately.

Swiss Timing Scoring System – WCH

As always, Swiss Timing was used for the WCH and as the system, there was no problem. We revised the system entering for the Difficulty by entering each element value and for the Artistry, the judges entered each criteria scale, and the system calculated the total scores. We checked thoroughly in advance, and everything went smoothly and very well.

Warning

During the WAGC, verbal warning was given to a NF for holding their National Flag at the Kiss & Cry area. After this verbal warning, the NF did not repeat the same again. Also, the AER-TC have given 7 judges with verbal warnings due to some inconsistent judging. But after the verbal warnings, all the judges concentrated more carefully and applied the CoP.

Inquiry

WAGC: 3 inquiries; 2 scores unchanged and 1 score changed to higher.

WCH: 2 inquiries; 2 scores unchanged.

Conclusion:

Beginning of the WAGC, the weather was little bad with rain and strong wind but when the competition began, the weather was nice.

For the WCH, the weather was wonderful throughout.

Arena was nice with temperature at the FoP except for the meeting rooms where it was little humid and warm. I believe gymnasts took care of themselves to keep their body in condition during the competition.

LOC organization with the transportation was well scheduled. The access to each area were strictly under control with checking the QR Code on the accreditation which have occurred little duration for people to get through, but after the 1st day of the training of the WAGC, inspections were more smoothly checked.

One concern was with the entries of IM and IW for Junior and Senior. Although the AER-TC have proposed to increase the number of entries from 1 to 3, the duration of the qualification competition did take long. This may need more analysis for the future competitions.

All the organizations were well done, and we are very happy that the WAGC and WCH have completed without any major problems.

Finally, I'd like to thank all my colleagues for their hard work during these 3 weeks.

Rogério Valério (RV) declared the meeting open and welcomed the committee. The agenda for this meeting was approved and the minutes of the last meeting held in Aracaju (BRA) in March 2024.

2. Report from the FIG Executive meeting in Shanghai

RV shared an update of significant information from the EC meeting.

3. Events

a. GfA Colloquium 2024 Review

A personal review of the agenda was presented from each GfA C. Member.

- i. Positive feedback: The range of topics catered for all experiences of Gymnastics for All. A very full schedule which was well balanced between presentations, discussion groups, activities and networking. A three-day colloquium is the right amount of time to cover the structure of Day 1 FIG GfA Events and Developments, Day 2 Unique developmental theme, Day 3 Federation focus, sharing good practice and networking. Logo, photography and presentation display were very high quality.
- ii. Areas to develop and explore: Understand the travel implications and costs when the host venue is selected. Bring wider experiences outside of gymnastics and Gymnastics for All that are relatable to GfA work to enhance learning. Consider creating an abstract resume document following the event to share the high-level detail of the presentations.
- iii. Main priority for follow up is the update to the GfA manual.
- iv. Next themes How to retain more boys in Gymnastics for All.

b. GfA Colloquium 2025

Reflections

The WTC did a deep analysis of the Paris Olympic Games, focussing on specific situations which occurred during the Games.

It prompted reflections on improving t the rules and procedures, as well as implementing technological support in the future.

More than ever the WTC is committed to seizing this opportunity to study measures aimed at improving the overall organization and resolving the difficulties encountered.

❖ E-Judges award letters based on JEP (Judges Evaluation Programme)

According to the General Judges' Rules, letters will be sent to the E judges with overall "Excellent" evaluation and "Excellent" or "Very good" evaluation in all phases of the competition. There are 13 E-judges eligible to receive the "Excellence in Judging Award".

2. Newsletter #4

It will be published by the end of September 2024 and it will include the new elements performed until August 2024.

3. Preparation of the Judges' Courses 16th Cycle

The WTC revised and finalised the Power Point presentations each member prepared for the education of the judges at the Judges' Courses.

All presentations will be published on the STS platform by the middle of October, together with a selected number of exercises with the D- and E- evaluations.

All TC members evaluated the D & E routines for the judges' exams and allocated them into low, medium and high levels.

 - Arturs welcomed the committee to Shanghai.
 - Explained the schedule and special activities for the week. Stressed that priorities are the current Code of Points corrections, Judges Course for Paris and International Judges course instruction and videos.
 - The agenda was reviewed, and any other new items will be added to A.O.B
- 2. Approval of Agenda.
 - The MTC unanimously approved the agenda.
- 3. Approval of Minutes from past meeting.
 - The MTC unanimously approved the minutes of the January meeting.
- 4. Information and correspondence.
 - Information from MTC members.
 - Andv

Attended the Cairo World Cup, and reported it was a very well-run event with a high level of competitors.

Attended the Baku World Cup as TD, an experienced team delivered another world class event. The process of qualification for the Olympic spots led to an exciting and high level of competition. FIG currently invite World Champions with costs borne by organizers, in first two competitions a gymnast attended but did not compete.

At the Challenge Cup in Antalya had an opportunity to practice Live Judging and sees a strong future for it to develop the sport.

Osijek Challenge World Cup event was a spectacle as usual and hopes that one day the FIG will use a similar style of exciting event specifically the medal ceremony.



Europeans Championships in Rimini - Team final was on the final day of competition and as with other team competitions was very exciting with the final High Bar exercise deciding the winners.

Asia Championships in Tashkent – excellent hosting, in a great arena impressive score board. Due to Olympic qualifying events Japan did not attend.

o Julio

Was TD in Cottbus and as usual was a well-run event. There was an issue with the cables on High Bar, but in the end the situation was resolved positively. Also attended the event in Koper. Experienced some issues with the scoring program in terms of seeing and controlling the judges scores if necessary. The Elevien system was utilized at this event and produced very good quality videos. In general, felt it was a wonderful competition.

Dmitrii

Is continuing his work, on behalf of the TC, with Fujitsu. One competition, the Armenian Friendship Cup. 6 countries attended with junior athletes.

Aljaz

Attended European Championships, as did many TC members. Explained the process that will happen to select the various athlete representatives and the President of the Athletes Commission. Was also selected as Safe-Guarding officer for the Paris Olympic Games.

o Han

Was the TD for Cairo World Cup and thanked Arturs and Andy for their help. New element performed—double layout off the end of the Parallel Bars. Tashkent Asian Championships was a well-run event with one exception, which was some problems with the scoring system.

Butch

Butch's main work has been on getting the new code into the STS system.

o Jeff

Had quite a busy period as well. First attended the World Cup in Doha. This event also served as the final event in selecting the World Cup Qualifiers for the Olympics as well as the overall World Cup series winner. Therefore, it was quite a stressful event for everyone concerned. The TC strongly recommends that additional TC members must attend these World Cup competitions. Ensuring that all protocols and rules are followed perfectly, and that the event runs smoothly, is very difficult for one TD to manage on their own.

In terms of the World Cup series winners. It would be good to find a way to ensure that the overall series winner attends the final competition in the series. Several series winners were not in Doha.

And lastly, Jeff noticed that the quality of the Trophy's presented to the series winners did not appear to be of a very high quality. Recommendation that a



standardized design and high-quality trophy be developed and used at all subsequent World Cup series winners.

Following Doha Jeff attended the Pacific Rim Championships in Cali, Columbia. This competition sadly had many issues with equipment and scheduling and with a facility that when it rained, water came through the roof into the arena.

It cannot be stressed what an exceptional job was done by Dan Bachman as the competition Technical Delegate. In the end, due to his hard work, a relatively positive experience was had by the gymnasts and that is the most important thig obviously. Jeff was the appointed TD to the African championships in Morocco. The venues and accommodations were all excellent. The event itself went very well and the only concern he had was that the competition gym was quite warm. Recommendation for the future is that gyms must have a form of climate control. (air conditioning or heating depending)

Arturs

Following our last meeting Arturs went to Madrid for the ORIS Homologation review. This is critical task to make sure scoring works perfectly.

Swiss Timing is also working to create new and interesting features for the competition scoring.

Attended Cairo World Cup and felt it was again a nice competition.

EC meeting in Uganda was a very good meeting for the committee. Approval of many of the various rules necessary for the next cycle were passed such as Specific and General Judges rules.

Attended Baku WC and it was a wonderful event, but sadly one bad injury occurred on Vault.

Arturs was involved in further testing of "Live Judging" during the competition in Antalya and Varna World Challenge cups. Felt that the testing was very successful and believes it has good potential for future use.

Also attended the Asian Championship in Tashkent and commended Dr. Han on a well-run competition.

5. 2024 World Cup series review

- Analyze from MTC members.
 - Dr Han reported on the Cairo World Cup.
 - There were 58 federations and 165 athletes.
 - There was no podium.
 - Huge area, lack of spectators.
 - Warmup hall was on different level, far.
 - Temperature was controlled.
 - Scoring and video recording system was very good.
 - Transportation could have been better for the athletes.
 - Julio reported on the Cottbus World Cup
 - There were 67 federations and 199 gymnasts
 - There was no podium.
 - Small arena, many spectators (inadequate space for delegations seating)
 - Warmup was close by, but a small space.
 - Scoring system and video recording was good.



- Transportation was excellent.
- One issue occurred with the cable tension on High Bar.
- Andy reported on the Baku World Cup
 - 56 federations and 166 athletes
 - On podium
 - Comfortable size arena, average number of spectators,
 - Warmup hall adjacent to the competition hall
 - Scoring system and video was excellent.
 - Transportation was excellent and a recommended format for events.
 - An inquiry issue occurred where the inquiry was delivered to the judges table and not the inquiry table.
- Jeff reported in the Doha World Cup
 - There were 36 federations and 82 athletes.
 - On podium
 - Comfortable size arena, big number of spectators during finals.
 - Warmup hall close by and good
 - Scoring system and videos were very good.
 - Transportation- there were 3 hotels, and one was 10km away, which meant a longer commute for some.
 - As the final event in the World Cup series there was a lot of pressure, and it is highly recommended that more than one TC member attend as Technical Delegates.
 - Not all World Cup series winners were present in Doha for the culmination of the series.
 - The quality of the trophy awarded for the series winner could have been of a higher quality. Recommend that for the future the FIG design and produce a trophy that will be consistently used in awarding to all future World Cup series winners.
- PCVR (selectively)
 - The TC reviewed several exercises from the Finals competition of the World Cup series in Doha. It is clear to the TC that in the future, in a situation where the Technical Delegate(s) are not in agreement with the E-score(s), that a mechanism be put in place that would allow them to block the Final Score until a review can occur. This is to be done only with the goal of insuring a correct Ranking of the athletes.
- 6. 2024 Olympic Games

 - Arturs went through all the details he currently has on the Olympic Games with the TC.
- 7. 2024 Olympic judges' instruction preparation
 - Full E and D presentations.

 - The live scoring process has now been tested in a few events and, so far, has shown itself to be very practical and easy to use. The data that can be seen provides extremely useful information such as the specific deductions taken per element and if all judges agree or not.
 - Working group created a dashboard prototype that allows quick and full access to information about judges' work. You may have a perspective of deductions taken by judges in a simulated environment (for education matters it is helpful for the judges, coaches, gymnasts, and even for TC)
 - Arturs is confident, that this way of inputting deductions is in accordance to CoP and no need for years of education and adaptation for judges to use "Live scoring" device.
 - The primary goals of transparency, speed and for educational purposes from live scoring, looks like they could be achieved by its utilization.

12. A.O.B

- i. Bibs and advertising
 - o The following statement is from the FIG Technical Regulations:

Art. 5.7 Competitors' Numbers (Bibs)

In Artistic Gymnastics, the competitors' numbers must be worn and firmly attached to the back of the uniform during the whole competition. Bib numbers should be allocated to all gymnasts, including the team reserve gymnast, and distributed according to the Work Plan provisions.

In Rhythmic Gymnastics, Trampoline Gymnastics, Acrobatic Gymnastics, Aerobic Gymnastics and Parkour, the gymnasts/athletes' numbers, or the groups' numbers are shown on the display board.



- The MTC, on the recommendation of the athlete's representative, based on feedback from MAG athletes, would like to remove the requirement of the Men's Artistic gymnasts to wear a bib. This would bring Men's Artistic in line with other FIG disciplines and provide more safety for the male athletes.
- ii. Removal of names from the Code of Points
 - The TC has decided that, in consultation with the FIG Safeguarding Commission, they can temporarily, or permanently, remove the name of an athlete's name from the Code of Points
- iii. Injuries on the Vault
 - The MTC is concerned about the severity of injuries on the Vault. The TC would like to study and define what other disciplines use for mats and what have their experiences been. For example, what is used in Double Mini trampoline? Dr Han. will begin the process by reviewing the number and severity of injuries that have occurred. The TC believes it is possible that changing or re-configuring the mats used on Vault may help reduce injuries. However scientific studies will need to be done.

1. Welcome and approval of the agenda

TYK welcomed all the TC members present.

The agenda was approved with following additional issues:

- 7. WAGC and WCH: schedule for finals
- AOB:
 - a. New Element from FRA,
 - b. CoP minor clarifications from NF feedback
 - c. Clarifications on current difficulty and acrobatic element
 - d. Information delivered by the TC, plan how including more usage of the STS platform.

2. Approval of the Minutes

The minutes of the last meeting in Lausanne (SUI) were unanimously approved.

3. TC President's Report

TYK informed following:

- FIG EC Meeting in May (Shanghai), a proposal from African Union to divide the Trio Category into 3 different categories: Men TR, Women TR and Mixed TR.
- Re-branding Commission: proposals for changing disciplines' names from "Aerobic Gymnastics" to "Aerobic". TYK spoke with some NF and judges and hear that the name "Aerobic Gymnastics" receives some support from their government since it is different from the fitness. But if becomes only "Aerobics", then the government may not understand the differences. TYK also reported that the word "Aerobic" is adjective, so maybe better to say "Aerobics" if only one word. FIG will inform the rebranding commission.
- World Cups 2025: the hosting countries POR and JPN made their bids.
- Requirements of hosting the WCHs and WCups were currently quite high with the obstacles.
 TYK asked to the Competition Commission to check and see if non-Olympic disciplines can reduce some obstacles for the condition of hosting, it may lead to more possibilities for NF to host 2026 and 2028 WCHs as well as WCups.
- Questions about the list of candidates for elections have been received from AER community. The AER-TC is also concerned and will ask more explanation at the next FIG EC meeting.



4. Preparation update for the WAGC and WCH
